

THE MAJOR STORM: HURRICANE ANDREW

When we lived in Wisconsin and Lyle worked for RTE-ASEA, we'd listen to the news about the hurricanes in Florida. Lyle would always say, "There's more work for us." They made transformers ranging in size from those that hung on poles to huge ones that were transported on a railroad car.

When we moved to Florida, Lyle would point out the transformers that were made by RTE-ASEA.

Then came Hurricane Andrw. We tracked it across the Atlantic on TV. When it hit Miami, especially Homestead and started across the southern tip of Florida, we began to wonder what we should do. The TV said, "leave," but where should we go? We only knew people in Harbor Cove and they were in the same boat. Manufactured homes were especially vulnerable, and the police came through with loudspeakers, telling us to leave.

Our solution: we got in our car and headed north

as the hurricane came west. Listening to the radio, we learned the hurricane turned north, but was downgraded. We turned east. When Hurricane Andrew turned east, we went south. It probably was a tropical storm by now. As Andrew finally was no longer a threat, we returned home. But we wondered if we would be so lucky when the next one came.

Eventually so did the state, from the local community on up. While national insurance companies fled the state or formed Florida companies with very poor coverage, we were stuck. I can't remember the details, but the state started to organize communities with the help of the Red Cross and set up shelters at designated schools. That's where we were to go. Over the next few years, hospitals and shelters were set up for secial needs people and pets. Emergency Management was set up with the cooperation of police and fire departments. Small communities, such as Harbor Cove, were encouraged to organize to help close homes and give local warnings. We were also encouraged to set up after after storm plans to check out the damage and keep our community safe from vandals until the police and



fire departments could come and help. Harbor Covr did set up an extensive emergency management committee covering pre and post storm activities.

It as after Hurricane Andrew that a yearly brochure as published by newspapers to assist people in preparing their homes and planning for their evacuation and after storm needs.

Shortly before Hurricane Charlie an organization called CERTS was organized. If your community was interested, they would send an instructor to train your group in how to safely inspect for damage and injuries. Simple first aid, even setting up a triage area to make injured residents comfortable. Even Harbor Cove had a group trained for these activities.

Since the year of "Charlie" and three other threatening hurricanes, things have been quiet. The Harbor Cove Emergency Management and CERTS group aged and with no forthcoming interest, it now is disarray. EVERYONE IS ON THEIR OWN AGAIN.

HURRICANES WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP YOURSELF By Bonnie Erfourth

1. Pick up a 2014 Hurricane Guide or if you're here, get the 2015 guide. It tells how

to prepare, what to do during and after a hurricane. It has maps, local shelters listed, what you need to pack and have on and as well as information for pet care.

- Check your homes. All outdoor items that can be lifted need to be put inside the home or shed. The hurricane winds are stronger than you are. Flying objects endanger people and property.
- 3. If you need special care, the office should have the paperwork to fill out by you and your doctor. There will be a number to call and register. They will even come and pick you up and take you to a shelter for your needs.
- 4. If you are a snowbird, be sure the office and the person caring for your home has your phone number and e-mail. It probably would be good for your home caretaker to know your insurance carrier.
- 5. If you are a year round resident, evacuate when told to do so. You may have a home built to withstand 250 miles per hour

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- winds, but sewer and electricity are not guaranteed.
- 6. If you are injured, you don't know when help will come. County emergency numbers have their priorities. Your community may not be at the top of the list.
