Since we have to send articles for The Press to the publisher well in advance of when the issue comes out, I want to bring you up to date on Community projects before we head out on a long awaited June vacation.

Pickleball Courts - Sun is finalizing vendor scheduling looking at July or August for an estimated start time, although an actual date is not yet confirmed. Management will provide a firm timeline as soon as it is established.

TAXES AND BENEFICIARIES

First and foremost, no one pays federal tax on inheriting an asset. It is only when the beneficiary does something with the asset that an income tax may occur. You should regularly review your beneficiary designations because different states do have inheritance taxes - as I've mentioned in past articles- and the class of beneficiary can determine whether they are subject to a tax and at what rate they are subjected. Marriage, divorce, birth of a child or the death of family member can drastically change your Will or your direct beneficiary on accounts. The beneficiary on a retirement account, such as a 401K or IRA, will override any other instructions even in your Will. Usually, assets automatically pass to your spouse, if you are married, or to your estate, if unmarried, but not when you name a beneficiary. If you are married, but name your children as beneficiaries, they will inherit not your spouse. When choosing beneficiaries on nonretirement accounts, you should consider your overall estate strategy and how the asset will impact the beneficiary's taxes.

You should name a primary beneficiary, who is the initial person or entity you designate to receive the asset upon your death. You can pick an individual or a charitable organization or your estate. You should also pick a secondary, or contingent, beneficiary in case all the primary beneficiaries are deceased, unlocatable, or refuse the inheritance. You can name multiple beneficiaries and assign them different percentages of your assets. Choosing a beneficiary is a deeply personal decision shaped by various factors, including relationships, family dynamics, and overall financial objectives.

One needs to consider how your choices might affect family relationships. Naming one child as a beneficiary of a retirement account and not others could cause resentment unless balanced out with other legacies. The tax implications vary also by the type of beneficiary. A spouse can inherit a traditional IRA with more flexible options than a non-spouse. A non-spouse must withdraw the funds within 10 years and pay taxes on them. If you leave these tax deferred accounts to a qualified charity, they are exempt from paying income tax on the distribution.

Sometimes, you may leave the family home or second home to children who have different financial goals. One may want to keep the home and live in it while another wants to sell and get the money. If a beneficiary lives in an inherited house for 2 years from the date the deceased person died, they can qualify for the Personal Residence Exclusion of \$250,000 profit per person. If the beneficiary decides to sell right away or doesn't live in the property, then the profit will be subject to capital gains tax. The starting basis for the property is still the value of the property on the date of death of the deceased owner. That basis was one of the

issues in the last Presidential election. won, keeping the basis as the fair market value on the date of death. The idea that lost wanted the basis to be the deceased person's original basis. That would have meant a much bigger profit on the sale of the asset, and, thus, much more tax collected. Tax laws do change from the time we make our plans until they are carried out. Forethought helps a lot but you can't anticipate everything.

It is sometimes better to not leave assets to be jointly split between beneficiaries. Instead, perhaps give them different assets with the same monetary value. That way there is no arguing over when wants to sell the family home and one wants to keep it. Yes, that could be settled by one buying the other one's half out but that second beneficiary needs money to pay off the first one. That often doesn't happen with adult children in their 30-50 age range who don't have excess cash to buy out their co-owner.

Some people think leaving their children their IRA accounts will then enable the son or daughter to pay off their mortgage. However, that beneficiary will get clobbered with taxes if they withdraw the whole amount (\$100,000 for example) in one lump sum. The beneficiary is probably working at a job perhaps making \$150,000, which is the 24% tax bracket for a single person. Put another \$100,000 on top of that W-2 income and you are now in the 32% bracket. So, the beneficiary doesn't have that IRA \$100,000 to pay down their mortgage; they have \$68,000. "Uncle Sam" took \$32,000 in taxes plus any additional state tax if they live in a state with state income tax. Unfortunately, Mom or Dad's wishes to pay off the child's mortgage when they die won't quite be realized.

If you inherit a Roth IRA, which means the taxes were paid before you put the money in, then all the withdrawals after inheritance are tax free. This is something a parent should think about when they are making contributions to an IRA. In a Roth IRA they not only get to withdraw tax free money while they are alive, but they can leave tax free money to their children or friends. As of 2019 all types of inherited IRA's (Regular and Roth) must now be distributed within 10 years of inheritance. That prevents saving the money for the beneficiaries' retirement unfortunately. It also impacts the tax rate as I have previously stated. When the beneficiary is working and has a larger income they will pay at a higher tax rate, than if they could have waited until they retired and withdrawn the money at a lower tax rate.

Some people have no children or family surviving to whom to leave their estate. In that case they should designate charities as beneficiaries or fund a scholarship or give to a deserving group of people. Have you put beneficiaries on every bank and financial account and annuity and life insurance policy you have? Having named beneficiary or Payable on Death designation on every asset side steps probate. Putting houses and cars titles into other people's names does present more of a problem and should be discussed carefully with a lawyer. There is no waiting to distribute the asset if there is a named beneficiary; it goes right to the beneficiary. Items still in the deceased name being distributed only by the Will need to go through probate court, which can take several months.

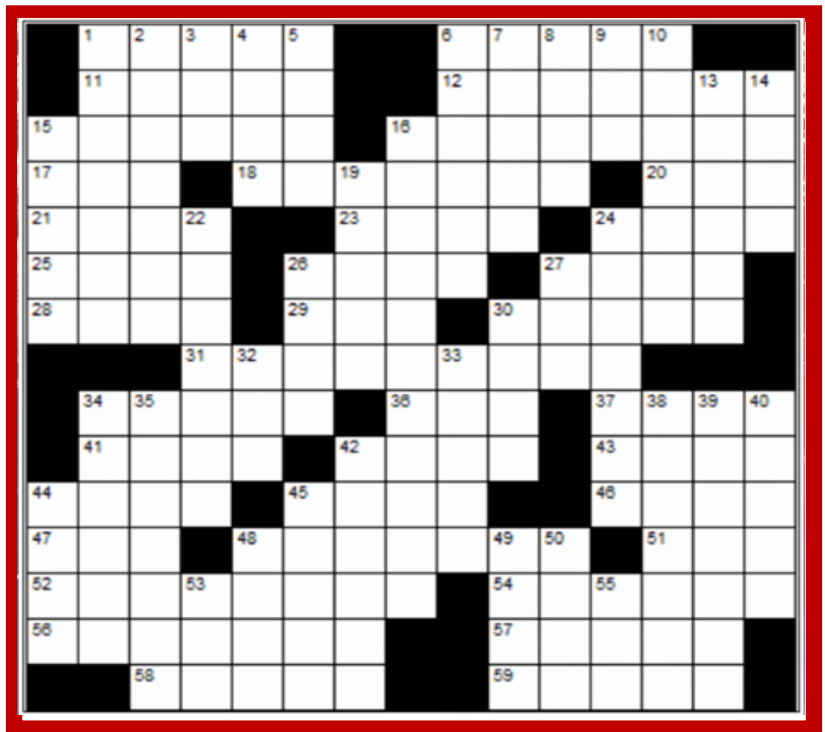

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HISTORICAL BUILDINGS CONCLUSION

If you leave Walmart by the south entrance and head straight across to 1710 Jackson Street, you find an **“Okie Bland” style house**, next door to HALO. Part of an early 1920’s planned “Ocean Breeze” subdivision, it was one of the few houses actually built by realtor O.K. Bland before the Florida real estate boom began to sour in the mid 1920s.

At the foot of Jackson St, along Indian River Drive sits **“May’s Marina”**, originally a fish house, then rebuilt after the 1926 hurricane. Now it’s the home of Sebastian Saltwater Restaurant. Next door at 1740 is the **Archie Smith Fish House**, dating to the 1930’s. Smith resided there until his death in 1986. The wharf beside the home led out over the water to a shack where fresh-caught fish were processed, packed in barrels with ice and moved along the tracks, then to the railroad to be shipped north. This only fish houses remaining along the river was purchased by Indian River County. The refurbishment plans never happened and the building is deteriorating. The shack over the water collapsed into the river a couple of years ago.

If you head north on Indian River Drive, you’ll be outside city limits but there’s 4 more buildings to see. At 13425 Indian River Drive is the large 2 story **Jesse Younge House**, built in 1909. Now privately owned and restored, it stand on a large lot facing the river. Next, on the river at 13690, this building was the home of Arlo Guthrie until recently. It started as the first freezer plant in the county. Later it became the WW II Coast Guard Commissary and a crab house before being converted to a residence and studio by Arlo.

Facing the river, at 13875 is the 2 story **Colonel Ruffner House**, built in 1896 so one of the oldest in the area. I’ve written about the family before – perhaps you remember hearing the cement pond out front of the house where Mrs. Ruffner kept her pet, a full grown alligator. When Indian River Drive was US 1 through Sebastian he attracted a lot of attention.

Lastly, at the corner of Indian River Drive and Bay Street is the **Donald Mac Donald House**, built in 1904, facing the river. A modern addition, on the south side, was designed to resemble the original house.

If you have little time now, make sure you see the old **McCain’s Garage / Hurricane Harbor** building at 1540 Indian River Drive as it will be torn down soon. Built in 1927, it played a big role in bootlegging in Sebastian during Prohibition. Later it became a restaurant that was a fixture in Sebastian for more than 30 years. Most recently it was bought by the city and served as Crabby Bill’s Seafood, next door to the Crab Stop. It suffered a lot of damage in the 2004 hurricanes. Termite damage, and neglect played a role in its downfall, now deemed beyond repair. Because of numerous changes from the original structure it does not qualify for National Historic Register inclusion.

Our Sebastian Area Historical Society has produced several Tour Guides (\$4) to allow you to walk or

drive around town and identify. A new addition was produced in 2006 after many buildings suffered severe or fatal damage. In the hurricanes of 2004. Buildings lost in the 2004 hurricanes are mentioned in the 2006 edition but even some of those remaining buildings are now gone. The biggest loss in my memory was the **George Cain House** once located at 1531 US 1. It was called the **“snowshoe house”** because of the pair hung outside the door, certainly an odd sight in Florida. The nearby shopping center wanted to expand and the house had to go. The city raised money to move it to Riverview Park but without a clear plan, or funding, there it sat there, eventually deteriorating and subject to vandalism. Sadly it was eventually torn down.

This trip took us to the Cintron Bistro, 6260 Jimmy Buffett Memorial Highway, off A1A, Vero Beach. The Bistro is part of the Village Shops and provides a relaxed atmosphere, offering both indoor and outdoor dining. It serves lunch Monday through Friday 11:00 am to 3:00 pm, brunch Saturday and Sunday 11:00 am to 3:00 pm, Dinner daily 5:00 pm to 8:00 pm, reservations are strongly recommended for dinner.

We went for lunch and sat outside which is lovely, with many tables with large umbrellas surrounded by a group of upscale shops. Our waitress Alyssa approached us promptly and gave us menus and ample time to review and make our choices.

On to our choices: Beet & Goat Cheese Salad; red and gold beets, toasted almonds, goat cheese, mandarin orange, Arcadia greens, ginger citrus vinaigrette, \$18.00 added grilled chicken \$7.00, very good. Cobb salad, roasted chicken, avocado, tomato, bacon, crumbled blue cheese, Arcadian greens, hard boiled egg, lemon oregano vinaigrette, \$21.00 very good. filling. Chicken Caesar wrap blackened served with kettle chips \$19.00, very good and ample serving, Bistro Burger 8oz. Angus beef, bacon, Swiss cheese, pepper bacon jam, arugula, tomato on a brioche bun, served with fries we substituted truffle fries for \$1.50 more, burger was \$24.00, delicious.

The atmosphere was very relaxed and you certainly are not rushed to leave. In fact, we left the hubbies relaxing at the table while we explored the unique Vero Shops (\$\$\$\$) - it's always fun to look! They actually have a gourmet cheese shop, Coastal shop, cashmere shop, J. McLaughlin, Tommy Bahama, and others. You can spend a whole day browsing.

Our overall rating for the restaurant, the shops and the overall vibe would be a solid 5.

We would like to mention what a moving Memorial Day Ceremony Bill White put together to honor all our veterans, as well as honoring Kathy Robert's memory, gone but never forgotten.

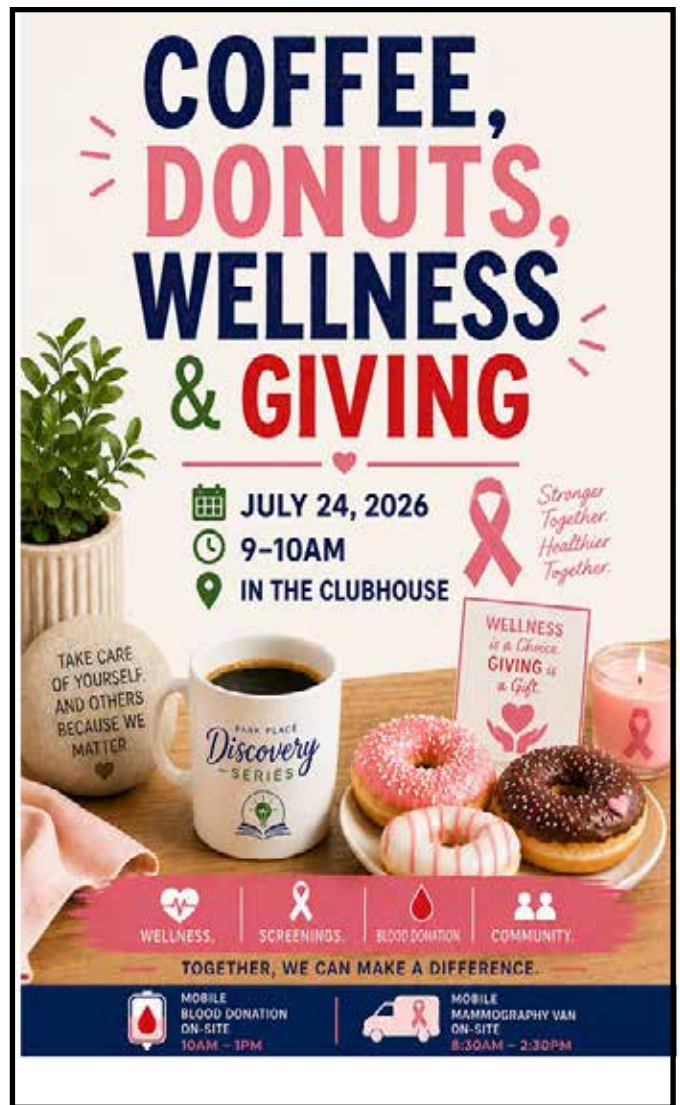

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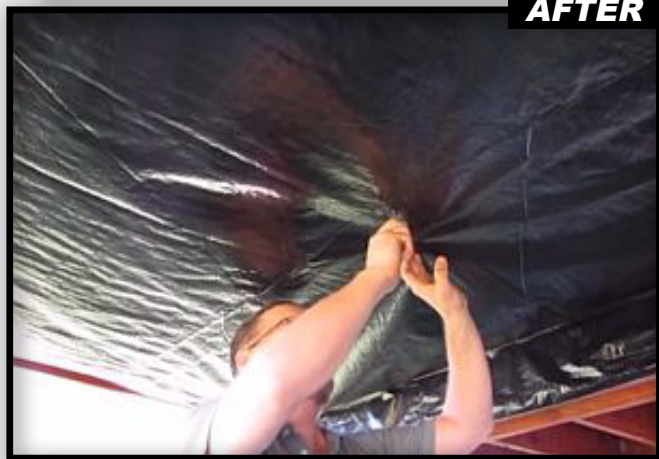
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
