

Those verses are the earliest written version of the song as we sing today.

(Scottish for 'old long since' or 'days gone by')

Should auld acquaintance be forgot,
And never brought to mind?
Should auld acquaintance be forgot,
And days o' auld lang syne?

Chorus:

For auld lang syne, my dear,
For auld lang syne,
We'll take a cup o' kindness yet,
For auld lang syne.

We two have run about the hills,
And pulled the daisies fine;
But we've wander'd many a weary foot,
Since auld lang syne.

We two have paddled in the brook,
From mornin' sun till dinnertime;
But seas between us broad have roar'd,
Since auld lang syne.

And there's a hand, my trusty friend,
And give us a hand o' thine;
And we'll take a right goodwill draft,
For auld lang syne.

And surely ye'll buy your pint-cup,
And surely I'll buy mine;
And we'll take a cup o' kindness yet,
For auld lang syne."

SATURDAY IN THE PARK

I've always been a huge fan of the song "Saturday in the Park" by Chicago, especially the part about the ice cream man singing Italian songs. The other day, I was riding my golf cart in "our" park (Bulow Plantation Ruins Historic State Park) and I couldn't help but think about

how lucky I am to have this amazing State Park literally in our backyard. When Glenda and I were thinking about moving to Plantation Oaks, we had no idea the Park even existed. Finding out about the Park was like the cherry and whipped cream on top of an ice cream sundae! Wandering around the Park has become my favorite thing to do, even more than fishing. I can't stop talking about the Park to my friends and neighbors, and I'm always amazed by how many people have never been to it.



So, if you haven't been to the Park yet, let me give you a heads up. It's just next door! We, the folks at Plantation Oaks, can easily access it by going through the side gate (using the same gate opener as the front gate). This will take us straight to "Old Beach Road." Now, here's the cool part:

this road has a history dating back to the 1800s when Florida was a Spanish Colony. It's still pretty much the same as it was 200 years ago! Imagine stepping back in time and seeing the Indians, settlers, and wild animals that roamed the area. Old Beach Road originally connected Old Kings Road to the Atlantic Ocean, but now it ends at Bulow Creek inside the Park, marking the start of our next adventure.



Bulow Plantation Ruins Historic State Park is a small park (150 acres) but it's packed with history. I've been exploring Florida my whole life and have visited hundreds of parks, but, without question, "our" Park (listed in the National Register of Historic Sites) is truly amazing. The Bulow family once lived here and prospered by growing sugar cane, cotton, rice, and indigo. In 1836, during the Second Seminole War, the plantation was destroyed. The ruins of the former plantation, a sugar mill, a unique spring house, several wells, and the foundations of the plantation house and slave cabins show how dangerous life was on the Florida frontier in the early 19th century. The park also has a boat ramp and dock out over the creek, a museum, a picnic pavilion, nature trails, restrooms, and more. By now, I hope you're thinking, "Wow, I need to



check out this place," or "I need to spend more time at the Park!" Either way, it's a great way to spend a day. See ya there!

P.S. A one-day pass for the Park is only \$4 per car, and you can pay with your phone at the gate or online. But I highly recommend becoming a member of the "Friends of Tomoka Basin State Parks." Our Park is one of five parks in the Tomoka Park Basin, and membership is only \$35 a year. It includes 10 free entrances to any of the five Parks. You'll also get info on upcoming events and invitations to special events for members only. It's a great way to support the Park so it can continue to thrive.

COASTAL DINING IN JANUARY: A SHRIMP RECIPE FOR TWO!

While neighbors up north shovel snow, Flagler Beach locals are more likely to be shoveling shrimp onto their plates. January here isn't about battling blizzards, it's about enjoying the sunshine and mild temperatures while sharing meals that warm the soul. This is the time of year when local shrimp are abundant right off our shores — we see the boats every day, trawling just beyond the breakers! This Shrimp & White Bean Stew is less about filling a pot and more about filling a moment, turning a simple dinner into coastal dining experience just for two.

Why does this dish work? Winters in Florida call for comfort without heaviness. Cannellini beans and tender greens provide depth, while fresh local shrimp adds brightness and briny sweetness. The result is a dish that feels indulgent yet light enough for our subtropical evenings... and it's gluten-free (if you exclude the bread!)

Shrimp & White Bean Stew Serves 2

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- ½ medium onion, diced
- 1 carrot, diced
- 1 celery stalk, diced
- 3 garlic cloves, minced (more or less to taste)
- ½ tsp smoked paprika
- 1 tsp fresh thyme leaves
- 1 bay leaf
- 1½ cups chicken or vegetable stock
- 1 can (15 oz) cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
- 2 cups chopped greens (spinach, escarole, or Swiss chard)
- ½ pound fresh shrimp, peeled and deveined
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Lemon wedges, for serving

Method

1. Heat olive oil in a medium pot over medium heat. Sauté onion, carrot, and celery until softened, about 5 minutes. Add garlic and sauté until fragrant, 1 minute.
2. Stir in smoked paprika, thyme, and bay leaf. Add stock and beans. Simmer 10–12 minutes to meld flavors. Stir in greens until wilted (spinach 2–3 minutes, collards 10 minutes).



3. Add shrimp and simmer until pink and firm, 3–4 minutes. Then season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve hot with lemon wedges.

✦ Serving Notes

For a nice presentation, ladle the stew into wide, shallow bowls so the shrimp and greens are visible. Garnish with fresh thyme leaves and a squeeze of fresh lemon. Pair with crusty hot bread or cornbread for dipping.

🍷 Fun Drink Pairings

- Wine: A crisp Sauvignon Blanc or Pinot Grigio highlights the shrimp's sweetness.
- Beer: A local Flagler Beach craft lager offers a refreshing counterpoint.
- Non-alcoholic: Iced Tea or sparkling water with lemon keep it light and celebratory.

🌱 Sidebar: Publix-Friendly Substitutions

Not everyone loves kale, and luckily Publix makes it easy to swap:

- Spinach: Mild and tender, wilts quickly at the end.
- Swiss Chard: Earthy, with stems that sauté beautifully.
- Collard Greens: Southern staple, simmer 10 minutes for tenderness.
- Escarole: Labeled "Escarole" at Publix, classic Italian pairing with beans.
- Green Cabbage: Sweet, hearty leaves that hold up well in broth.
