

I saw my neighbor sitting in his brand-new 2025 electric car. He was staring at a manual trying to understand how to use all the screens, buttons, and other technology. This encounter brought back memories of me trying to figure out my first automobile.

WANDERING WEDNESDAYS

As you may recall, we're traveling through the upper Midwest, so our comments may not directly relate to local opportunities. However, I believe some of you might find this experience relatable.

Nevada, Iowa, the small town where I grew up, is hosting "The Wall That Heals" this week. This wall is a ¾-size replica of the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C. I'm sure many of you have been there; I've been a few times. So, it was more of a rerun, you might say. Nevada is the only community in Iowa to host this exhibit this year. They had the display on a beautiful grassy park, which was a fabulous tribute to those who gave their lives in service to our country during tough times.

Many of us in this community served during that time, and others likely remember the diverse moods of various factions in the country during the war. As a Vietnam Veteran who served in the Navy, I lacked combat experience. Instead, I worked the flight deck of an Aircraft Carrier (USS Bon Homme Richard, CVA 31) in a fighter jet squadron. The first name of interest to me was LTJG Lloyd G. Howie, a young pilot in my squadron who tragically lost his life while flying an F-8 Crusader. I also looked up my classmates, neighbors, and young men from neighboring communities. It was a profoundly solemn experience. Each time I visit the Memorial, I leave feeling depressed, saddened, and grateful for the opportunity I was given. The lives that were cut short too soon remain etched in my mind.

Even though this monument is quite depressing, I must admit that its design is incredibly beautiful, and it



conveys a profound message to those who pass by. The of nearly names 53,000 individuals are engraved so delicately that it requires a significant effort to find the one you are seeking. As you search through these names, you yourself find speaking the names of people you have never met before,

which serves as a startling reminder of the diverse

origins of the citizens who came to serve a government we once believed in. While I understand that the "Wall" may hold different meanings for various individuals, I find it difficult to envision it being viewed without any emotional connection. In my opinion, it stands as an unmatched memorial.

I'm aware that there are Vietnam Veterans and their families residing in our community. I'd like to bring to your attention that there's a registry dedicated to these veterans. The primary objective of this registry is to create profiles for both living and deceased veterans. You can access this information at the following website: https://registry.vvmf.org/ If the registry maintains the same level of quality as the memorial, it could be a worthwhile endeavor for you to contribute to. May God bless the USA and those who serve it.

NATIONAL COFFEE DAY 2025

Alton Brown's Coffee-Molasses Pork Chops Ingredients:

- 1 cup strong brewed coffee, cooled
- ½ cup molasses (regular not blackstrap)
- · 2 tbsp apple cider vinegar
- 1 tbsp Dijon mustard
- · 2 cloves garlic, minced
- · 1 tsp kosher salt
- ½ tsp ground ginger (or 1-2 tbsp grated fresh ginger)
- ½ tsp black pepper
- · 6-8 sprigs fresh thyme
- 4 bone-in pork chops (1-inch thick, 6–8 oz each)



Instructions:

- Combine all ingredients in a 1-gallon zip-top bag. Seal and shake to mix. Add pork chops and refrigerate for at least 2 hours, preferably overnight.
- Preheat grill to medium-high. Remove chops from marinade.
- Pour marinade into a saucepan and gently bring to a boil. Reduce heat and reduce to about ½ cup (12– 15 minutes). Strain sauce and return to pan. Cover and keep warm.
- 4. Grill pork chops 3-4 minutes per side, until internal temperature reaches 145°F. Let rest for 5 minutes. A baked potato topped with bacon, cheddar, and sour cream would pair nicely, along with some homemade applesauce or fried apples.

How Long Do Fireflies Live?

Protect Firefly Habitat

WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF WE DID NOT HAVE THE FMO & FLORIDA STATUTE 723?

Some items include:

- 1. No HOA as it stands.
- No power to negotiate with the park owner.
- 3. Eviction with a 7-day notice.
- Rents that can increase every 60 days with a 30-day notice.
- 5. Check out FS 723.031 -723.037 for details.

Remember, the FMO is an organization in Florida that watches out for the interests of manufactured home owners. Florida is the only state with laws for manufactured home owners, guaranteeing their right to their lifestyle.

Enacted in 1984, the Florida Manufactured Home Act (Florida Statute 723) addresses the relationship between park owners and homeowners. It recognizes the basic property rights of both and includes them in the law.

Florida Statute 723, updated frequently, is essential for all manufactured home owners. I would be happy to send you a digital copy in WORD or PDF just send me a request at dbmatlock@live.com. MENTAL CONFUSION

Whenever I teach clinical medicine to students in the fourth year of medicine, I ask the following question: What are the causes of mental confusion in the elderly? Some offer: "Tumors in the head". I answer: "No!" Others suggest:

"Early symptoms of Alzheimer's". I answer again: "No!" With each rejection of their answers, their responses dry up. And they are even more openmouthed when I list the three most common causes: uncontrolled diabetes. urinary infection, and dehydration.

It may sound like a joke, but it isn't. People over 60 often stop feeling thirsty and stop drinking fluids, leading to dehydration. Dehydration is severe and affects the entire body. It may cause abrupt mental confusion, a drop in blood pressure, increased heart palpitations, angina (chest pain), coma and even death. This habit of forgetting to drink fluids starts at age 60, when we have just over 50% of the water we need.

As we age, our water reserves decrease, and our internal balance mechanisms don't work well, making it difficult to feel thirsty and drink enough water.

Conclusion: People over 60 years old dehydrate easily, not only because they have a smaller water supply, but also because they do not feel the lack of water in the body. Although people over 60 may look healthy, the performance of reactions and chemical functions can damage their entire body. So here are two alerts:

- Get into the habit of drinking liquids. Liquids include water, juices, teas, coconut water, milk, soups, and water-rich fruits, such as watermelon, melon, peaches and pineapple; orange and tangerine also work. The important thing is that every two hours, you must drink some liquid - remember this!
- Alert for family members: constantly offer fluids to people over 60. At the same time, observe them. If you realize that they are rejecting liquids and, from one day to the next, they are irritable, breathless or display a lack of attention, these are almost certainly recurrent symptoms of dehydration.



SEPTEMBER GARDENING TIPS

What to Plant

Annuals/Perennials/Wildflowers: If summer beds need refreshing, try ageratum, coleus, celosia, zinnia, and wax begonia for color into fall.

Bulbs: Add color, texture, and pattern to the garden with the many varieties of elephant's ear that are available.

Herbs: Plant herbs that tolerate the warm temperatures of early fall, such as Mexican tarragon, mint, rosemary, and basil.

What to Do

Lawn problems: Continue to monitor the lawn for signs of insect damage. Fall army worms, chinch bugs, mole crickets, and sod webworms are still active this month.

Perennials and bulbs: Divide and replant perennials and bulbs that have grown too large or need rejuvenation. Add organic matter to new planting areas and monitor water needs during establishment.

Irrigation: Check that irrigation systems are providing good coverage and operating properly before summer rains taper off.

Citrus: Fertilize citrus with a balanced fertilizer either this month or in October. If the weather has been rainy, do not use soluble nitrogen as rains will leach it from the soil too quickly.

November 21 – Thanksgiving Dinner – prepared by the ladies this year! Dinner will begin at 5 PM. Ticket information will be forthcoming.



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




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
