

HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS FOR TROPICAL PALMS RESIDENTS

Hurricane season is upon us here in **Punta Gorda**, and while we hope for calm weather, it's always best to be prepared. Taking a few steps now can help keep you, your home, and our community safe.

1. Make a Hurricane Kit

Have essential supplies ready in an easy-to-carry container, including:

- Bottled water (at least 3 days' supply per person)
- Non-perishable food items
- Flashlights and extra batteries
- First aid kit and medications
- Important documents in a waterproof pouch
- Portable phone charger or power bank

2. Secure Your Home

- Bring in or tie down outdoor furniture, potted plants, and decorations.
- Close and lock windows and doors; consider installing storm shutters if you have them.
- Check that gutters and drains are clear to prevent flooding.

3. Have a Communication Plan

- Make sure family and friends know how to reach you.
- Have a list of emergency contacts handy, including local shelters and the Charlotte County Emergency Management Office.

4. Know Your Evacuation Routes

- Familiarize yourself with local evacuation zones.
- Follow evacuation notices issued by Charlotte County, do not weather the hurricane in your home.

5. Stay Informed

- Monitor reliable sources such as the National Hurricane Center and local news.
- Sign up for Charlotte County emergency alerts for timely updates.

Remember: Preparation is key. Even a tropical storm can bring heavy rain, flooding, and strong winds. By planning ahead, we can keep Tropical Palms safe and ready—no matter what the season brings.

WHAT IS CORNHOLE?

If you've strolled through the clubhouse area lately, you may have spotted folks tossing bean bags toward slanted boards with holes in them—laughing,



cheering, and maybe even showing off some serious aim. That's Cornhole, and it's quickly becoming one of the most popular games in 55+ communities across the country.

A Little History

Cornhole's origins are a mix of legend and Midwest tradition. The modern version we know today took off in Cincinnati, Ohio, in the late 20th century, but games involving tossing bags at targets go back hundreds of years. Some say a 19th-century Kentucky farmer created the first "corn-filled bag" toss game to pass time. Today, cornhole tournaments are played everywhere—from backyard BBQs to national championships.

The Basics: How to Play

- Teams: Two teams, either singles or doubles.
- Boards: Placed 27 feet apart (front edge to front edge).
- Scoring:
 - A bag through the hole = 3 points
 - A bag on the board = 1 point
 - Bags on the ground or hanging off the board without touching it = 0 points
- Winning: First team to reach or exceed 21 points wins.

Tips for Better Tosses

- 1. Aim for an arc: Bags thrown too flat tend to slide off.
- 2. Find your grip: Hold the bag from a corner for better spin and control.
- 3. Don't overthink: A smooth, relaxed motion is often the most accurate.
- 4. Play defense: If you can't score, try blocking your opponent's shot.

Why Cornhole is Perfect for Our Community Cornhole is low-impact, easy to learn, and can be played at a leisurely pace or in competitive tournaments. It's also a great way to meet neighbors, share a few laughs, and stay active without feeling like you're exercising.

So next time you see the boards set up -grab a

partner, a bag, and give it a toss. You might just be the next Tropical Palms Cornhole Champion! *
To join in the cornhole fun, stop by the clubhouse on Monday nights at 7pm to practice. Tournaments are held every Thursday night at 7pm. Tournament entry fee is \$2.00, with all the money paid back out to the winners.


TEACHERS

<u>ASK DEE</u>

Dear Dee:

My husband has been getting on my back because he says I drink too much. He keeps saying that I am going to end up like my father, who was a problem drinker. I am nothing



Dear Neighbor:

Without an actual assessment, I cannot evaluate whether or not you have an alcohol abuse disorder. I can, however, offer some insights on the potential dangers of alcohol abuse.

First of all, let's discuss the correlation between family history and substance disorders. According to the Prevention Research Institute, a person that has one or both parents who has or had a substance abuse issue, are themselves FOUR (4) times the likelihood of developing a disorder themselves. That does not

mean that they are doomed to be addicts. It simply means that they are more vulnerable. For a moment, let's think about some physical ailments. When we go to the doctors and they do a history, they often ask questions about family history of disorders like heart disease and diabetes. They do that because these diseases can be inherited. So, if your parent had a heart attack, are you guaranteed to have one as well? Of course not! However, you may need to be a little more careful with lifestyle choices than someone who has no familial history. The same concept applies to substance use disorders.

Secondly, let's talk about the fact that you drink for fun only. It is a misconception that only people who drink copious amounts of alcohol to "drown their sorrows" can develop addiction. The truth is that whether a person drinks too much for fun, or drinks too much to self-medicate against negative emotions, drinking too much leads to impairment, which can lead to problems.

Now let's discuss the fact that you do not get drunk easily. This is called tolerance. A person is born with a set tolerance level, but the more they drink over time, the higher the level goes up. People talk about tolerance like it is a positive quality. We have all heard phrases like ,"I can hold my liquor". Or "I can drink you under the table", etc. News alert! Tolerance is NOT a good thing! Someone with normal to low tolerance has a natural indicator when they are becoming impaired. They become aware of the "buzz", and often use this knowledge to stop drinking. A person with high tolerance is without this warning system. Imagine for a moment a beach with rough sand, broken shells, rocks, maybe a bottle cap or two. Someone with average feet would feel the pain of the sharp objects and stop walking on the sand. However, someone with deep callouses would not feel the pain and would keep walking. But those feet would still be cut to shreds! So tolerance is a liability, NOT an asset. It masks impairment.

DID YOU KNOW?

TARIFFS - A non-partisan view

Tariffs, often referred to as customs duties, are collected by the governing authority of a country that is importing goods from a foreign supplier and paid for by the domestic importer. Typically, tariffs are applied in order to protect domestic industries that produce the same products but are unable to create these products at prices that can compete with the foreign supplier. Without tariffs, the domestic supplier would just go out of business. That is the theory, and the theory is quite correct.

Today tariffs have become a diplomatic weapon to force changes in a foreign entity like changing unfair trade practices, penalize perpetrators of unjustified wars or unfair civil liberty/labor practices, etc., etc., or the government of the day simply doesn't "like" the foreign leader. Basically you can make up pretty much any excuse.

A tariff is a cost that the importer of the product must pay before taking delivery of the product. To stay in business the importer passes this cost on to the consumer. In some cases, the importer may simply reduce his profit margins to reduce the impact on the consumer or a lower initial cost might be renegotiated but these cost reductions tend to be small.

Tariffs are a simple taxation tool that have been around as long as communities have been trading with each other and in many cases used as the real or perceived grievance between two parties that have often led to conflict, armed or otherwise.

The Boston Tea Party is a classic example. The tariff imposed by the British Parliament became a rallying cry for the American War of Independence. "Taxation without Representation" was an issue that took 8+ years and a bloody conflict to resolve.

Tariff of 1828 ("Tariff of Abominations")

Enacted by the US Congress on May 19, 1828, this tariff raised import duties to 38%-50% on raw

materials like hemp wool. By protecting Northern KNOW industrial interests, it imposed



heavy costs on Southern agricultural states, which relied on inexpensive imports. Southerners saw it as unconstitutional and economically oppressive.

developed the doctrine of South Carolina nullification stating the state has the right to "nullify" any federal law it deems unconstitutional within its borders. It declared the tariffs null and void and threatened to secede from the Union. President Andrew Jackson and Congress passed the Force Bill authorizing Jackson to use military force to enforce the tariff. South Carolina "nullified" the Force Bill.

Over time, a compromise was reached but the arguments and philosophies presented over this 5 year legal and political conflict set a precedent for secessionist supporters and deepened the divide between North and South. It took another 37 years and a civil war to finally resolve the issue.

Tariffs as a Revenue Source

In 1800, tariffs were the largest revenue source for the federal government. In that year tariffs accounted for 90% of federal revenue.

By 1850, tariffs contributed only about 20%-30% of federal revenues.

By 1950, the importance of tariffs in the federal budget had dropped to around 2% and remained in that range until 2025.

In 2022, tariff revenues reached a record high of \$100 billion but was still just a little over 2% of total federal revenue.

In 2024 the tariff revenue was approximately 1.57%, and the forecast for 2025 was about 1.6%.

However, with the announcements on tariffs in 2025. the tariff revenue for the first 6 months has already exceeded the previous yearly record in 2022 of \$100 billion. Forecasts of tariff revenues for yearend vary dramatically from 5% to 10% of the federal revenue.

What has changed over the past 200+ years?

1. Government revenue streams have changed: Income tax approved by Congress in 1913, industry taxes, payroll taxes, land sales or land leases, etc., etc.

- Today's Global Economy has goods and services spread across the entire globe. Cars assembled in one country may have parts in them that were manufactured in many foreign locations. This did not exist in1950. The entire world is now economically connected.
- 3. Tariffs are now a policy tool, not a revenue backbone. They are used to not only protect domestic industries but to penalize foreign entities that are "not playing by the rules". Tariffs become a diplomatic weapon.
- National security concerns. The ongoing wellbeing of the country requires healthy industries in certain sectors to ensure its own security.

LOCAL FOOD BANKS IN THE PUNTA GORDA AREA: HOW TO DONATE OR GET HELP

When food assistance is needed or you want to help others—here's a list of local food pantries serving our community. These organizations offer resources ranging from monthly boxed groceries to hot meals for families and seniors.



Community Resource Center – Care & Share (Seniors 55+)

Offers free food kits—shelf-stable groceries and, when available, fresh produce and frozen meats

When: 1st Wednesday (general distribution) and 4th Wednesday (seniors-only), usually 10 AM–12 PM.

First Macedonia Missionary Baptist Church Food Pantry

Charlotte County Food Pantry

They often provide fresh produce, dairy, and protein, supporting healthy diets during tough times.

To receive food assistance or to donate:

- **Bring ID or proof of residency** when required (mostly for Charlotte County pantries).
- Note the hours and days—some operate monthly, others weekly.
- Call ahead to confirm current hours or any changes and to find out if they deliver.


